Message from the Board Chair

Our small, but competent and enthusiastic staff works diligently to connect with our many existing donors, nurture new donors, and ensure a well-managed grants program.

Donor Story: Smiles Through Lindsey



On September 20, 2015, Lindsey Kathleen More took her life at the age of 22 years. Lindsey kept her depression issues to herself and lost her battle with an illness that her family is still trying to comprehend. Lindsey was a person who would do anything for anyone, always making sure everyone was happy. She leaves behind memories that are full of love, laughter and adventure and had a smile that would light up anyone's day. Prior to her sudden passing and after a string of suicides at community high schools, Lindsey expressed the desire to help those who were suffering in silence through the school. Honouring her wishes, and to help keep Lindsey's legacy alive, the Smiles Thru Lindsey Foundation was created. The goal is to finance those suffering from mental illness through high impact programs. Developed in October 2015 through the Red Deer & District Community Foundation (RDDCF) as a donor advised fund by her parents Rick

and Cindy More, the Smiles Thru Lindsey name was carefully chosen to ensure that Lindsey would continue to smile for those that she helps. Since its inception 8 months ago, Smiles Thru Lindsey has raised just over \$100,000.00 from the generosity of citizens, business fund raisers and anonymous donors. Lindsey touched the hearts of so many people, and in her death she will continue to touch and help save the lives of more than she could have ever accomplished here on earth. Her memory is forever in our hearts and the foundation will continue to honour her memory in perpetuity.


Major Gift From Anonymous Donor

The Red Deer & District Community Foundation (RDDCF) received a significant donation from an anonymous donor in December 2015. The gift amounted to \$1,054,046, intended for the RDDCF's Operating Endowment Fund, a fund which supports the operations of the Community Foundation. This gift is the largest in recent history for the Community Foundation and will create a huge impact on the sustainability of the organization. The gift ensures that the Community Foundation will be around to fulfill its mission: to be a community catalyst committed to growing a legacy which strengthens the quality of life for our region, for many more years to come.

The gift will provide more opportunities for the Community Foundation to grow, to be more effective in encouraging philanthropic activity, and to be more responsive to the ever changing needs of the communities we serve through our grants programs.

Sylvan Lake Lighthouse

The Red Deer & District Community Foundation (RDDCF) was honored to participate in the rebuilding of the iconic Sylvan Lake Lighthouse. Spearheaded by the Sylvan Lake Sailing Club and championed by the Tourism Action Committee, the Sylvan Lake Marina and the Chamber of Commerce. The original lighthouse was build in 1988 to commemorate the town's 75th birthday, but was plagued with building deficiencies and was later demolished. With the town's 100th birthday celebration in 2013, the Sylvan Lake Rotary Club took the challenge to build another lighthouse in the same location. Through a partnership with the Town of Sylvan Lake, which now owned the land that held the original structure, the Sylvan Lake Rotary was able to raise approximately \$240,000. The partners then approached the RDDCF about creating a flow through fund at the Foundation. The Sylvan Lake Lighthouse Flow Through Fund was able to raise an additional \$100,000



engraved bricks that were placed in the lighthouse foundation. Similar to the original, the new lighthouse was designed after the famous Peggy's Cove structure in Nova Scotia. The new lighthouse now stands tall as an integral part of Sylvan Lake's identity and as a symbol of community building, and of the strength of collectively rallying behind a common goal.

Grant Stories

Over the past 26 years, the Community Foundation has disbursed over \$9 Million in grants to community projects and organizations across our region. The types of projects could not be more varied — we have funded everything from infrastructure and technological upgrades to staffing and programming costs. Our 360° funding mandate provides us the flexibility to work with organizations from ALL sectors—from arts and culture and human services to the environment and social justice.

24 community projects were funded through the Spring and Fall Grants Programs in 2015, through the General Endowment Fund. Here are a few of those initiatives:

Vacation Without Limits Subsidy Program

For most, arranging a recreational getaway with our families entails much thought and organization. Now, imagine for a moment, being an individual with a disability or part of a family/group with a person who has special needs. Planning a relaxing getaway on a limited income, that meets your needs at an affordable cost can prove to be even more complicated than most of us will ever experience. In 2009, the Cerebral Palsy Association in Alberta (CPAA) opened their Vacation Villa, a custom-built home in the Raymond Shore Resort on Gull Lake. The 950 square foot villa was designed with accessibility in mind and can accommodate individuals facing a variety of mobility issues. From a roll-in shower and portable lift on a ceiling track, to a commode chair, pool lift and paved pathways to the beach, this villa makes vacation dreams come true for all families with disabilities. The Vacation without Limits Subsidy Program is designed to help the families with a limited income be able to afford a simple vacation. The CPAA felt a strong need to create a program that can assist or fully fund these individuals to ensure that everyone has the opportunity to have a stress free vacation without limits.



Adult Assisted Volunteer Program—Red Deer & District S.P.C.A.



The Red Deer & District S.P.C.A. is committed to the well-being of the community as a whole. They provide essential community based services and programs that reach into the very heart of any community—compassion for the vulnerable, both human and animal. The Adult Assisted Volunteer Program provides individuals with special needs the opportunity to volunteer in the S.P.C.A. facility, thus allowing this vulnerable segment of the population to find a position of pride within the community. The program is win-win, with the animals receiving the unconditional love and care that they need, and the Assisted Volunteers receiving recognition for giving back to their community in a meaningful way. Working with seven different agencies in Red Deer, the S.P.C.A. Adult Assisted Program Coordinator provides blocks of time at the facility for people with special needs to come with an aide for volunteer shifts. Six volunteer positions are available including Cat Cuddling, Small Animal Socializers, and Kong Stuffing duties to name a few. Volunteer Patti Fraser (featured) has been a regular Cat Cuddling volunteer with the S.P.C.A. for 8 years. Her positive attitude, outgoing personality, and bright smile makes the day better for everyone she meets in the shelter and the cats love all the attention she gives them on her visits!

Sundre Nutrition For Learning Program

Research suggests that poorly nourished children are affected both socially and intellectually and the Sundre Nutrition for Learning Society believes that the responsibility for making sure that all children are able to reach their full learning potential rests within the community. Sundre and the surrounding rural communities, does not have easy access to a Food Bank and due to the ongoing economic struggles in both the oil and agricultural industries, teachers were seeing an increase in the number of students coming to school without lunch. Statistics show that approximately 30% of elementary students and 60% of high school students attend school in Canada with little or no nutrition and the in-school nutrition program aims to ensure that all kids receive the proper nutrition to help sustain them throughout the day. The Sundre Nutrition for Learning Society also strives to act as a means of intervention on the lifestyle choices of the communities youth; reinforcing healthier food habits both at school and at home.
