A Message from Our Board Chair



YEAR IN REVIEW WITH KRISTA NYMARK VANDENBRINK

In 2022, as the COVID-19 Pandemic began to slowly release its grip on Central Alberta, the Red Deer and District Community Foundation remained steadfast in its support of Red Deer and surrounding areas. Over the past few years we have gotten an up close and personal look at just how important it is to invest in the overall health of our people and communities. This lesson has been one that the Community Foundation lives every day through its commitment to fostering sustainable and long term support for the charitable sector and the agencies who are doing incredible work in Central Alberta.



One of the highlights of 2022 was international recognition of our Community Foundation's commitment to meaningful, effective and innovative grantmaking. This past year, the Grant Professionals Association named the Red Deer and District Community Foundation it's international Grantmaker of the Year for our participatory grantmaking process. This innovative process saw the applicants of our Fund for Gender Equality adjudicate the grant themselves. This process allowed them to find synergies in their projects, allowing them the opportunity to identify areas in which they could collaborate and share resources. What was considered a well-thought out experiment at the time, has now be recognized globally as an innovative step toward the future of impactful grantmaking.

Additionally, in 2022, the Community Foundation awarded more than \$100,000 in scholarships to Central Alberta students. Each year, our Youth in Philanthropy program allows us to venture into elementary, middle and high schools to teach the importance of philanthropy. In 2022, this program saw yet another successful year with students learning about and raising funds for The Mustard Seed, Paws + Claws Animal Rescue, Smiles Thru Lindsey, and the Central Alberta Humane Society. Our rural communities saw various steams of support from the Community Foundation, with thousands of dollars invested in projects in areas including, but not limited to, Stettler, Sylvan Like, Olds, and Mountainview County.

In 2022, several legacies were established and new endowment funds created to secure financial support for communities, causes and organizations around Central Alberta.

As we move forward into 2023, we maintain this commitment to creating legacies and building sustainable futures for the people and communities of Red Deer and surrounding areas. As we look ahead, we are excited for what 2023 has to bring. We are looking forward to working in the areas of diversity, equity and inclusion, social impact and sustainability, to further improve the quality of life for all in Central Alberta.

Scholarships



RECORD NUMBER OF SCHOLARSHIPS AWARDED TO CENTRAL ALBERTA STUDENTS

With the addition of another scholarship in 2022, the Red Deer & District Community Foundation gave away a record number of scholarships to local students this year. Over \$100,000 was awarded to students from Red Deer, Penhold, and surrounding areas.

"These scholarships make such an impact in the lives of students who are facing huge financial barriers as expenses associated with post-secondary education continue to grow," said Erin Peden, Executive Director of the Red Deer & District Community Foundation. "We are so proud to help facilitate financial awards that ease the burden of tuition costs and open the door of opportunity for students continuing on their educational journey."

Scholarships administered by the Community Foundation include the newly formed William Arthur Bower Memorial Scholarship, made possible by a \$1M donation by William Bower's nieces, Ruth and Dorothy Bower. This scholarship awarded \$5,000 to five students from Red Deer High Schools in 2022, as did the Ford Family Scholarship which awarded \$5,000 to five students from Penhold Crossing School.

Other scholarships with the Community Foundation include the Rex Turple Memorial Scholarship, the Murray Family Scholarship, the Trey Purdie Memorial Scholarship, the Dr. Don Church Scholarship, the A. Bernard & Mary B. Dixon Scholarship, the Brady Van Der Heide Citizenship Award, and the Rotary Career Opportunity Awards.

Fostering Philanthropic Culture



YOUTH IN PHILANTHROPY

2022 was busy for our Youth in Philanthropy (YIP) students who worked hard putting their philanthropy knowledge into practice by raising funds and making donations to charities chosen by the students themselves.

"Each year we provide participating schools with \$500 for students to create small grants for registered charities," Erin Peden, Executive Director of the Red Deer & District Community Foundation said. "The concept is to teach students the importance of understanding the social needs within their communities while determining how and where they would like to create impact with their grant."

The Grade 5 students from St. Martin de Porres School held an online art auction, selling art pieces that the students had created throughout the school year. The online art auction raised \$900.

These YIP students also researched and crafted presentations on various charities, ultimately voting to donate the money to The Humane Society, The Mustard Seed, and Smiles Thru Lindsey.



But the students were met with a surprise that their donations had been doubled, thanks to 100 Men Who Care Red Deer, who chose to support the Youth in Philanthropy program during their Fall meeting. Because of this additional donation, each charity was given \$600 by these generous and thoughtful Grade 5 students.

St. Francis YIP students hosted a popular "Pie the Principal" event to raise funds for their chosen charities, which were Paws and Claws Rescue Foundation, and Smiles Thru Lindsey. They also ran a student canteen, and facilitated a Staff Dress Down Week. In total, \$774 was raised, which was also doubled by the 100 Men Who Care donation.

Between both schools, this year's Youth in Philanthropy students distributed \$3,348 to:











VOLUNTEER CENTRAL GRANT CREATED

Created to carry on the mission of Volunteer Central, the Volunteer Central Legacy Grant will support agencies looking to enhance the development and sustainability of volunteerism within their organizations. After closing in 2021, the Volunteer Central Board of Directors made the decision to endow the remainder of the agency's assets to create this ongoing legacy.

"We are hoping that the Legacy fund will support professional development and/or educational programs to build capacity in the not-for-profit sector in volunteerism in Central Alberta," said Lynne Mulder, Volunteer Central Board Chair.

"We hope that this legacy fund can continue the work of Volunteer Central in a meaningful way," said Mulder. "I believe you can judge the health of a community by the activity of volunteers. Volunteerism is such an important part of any community."

Grantmaking in Action



GRANTMAKER OF THE YEAR AWARD

This year, the Red Deer & District Community Foundation was thrilled to accept the 2022 Grantmaker of the Year Award from the Grant Professionals Association (GPA).

This international award recognizes grantmaking organizations that have improved the way grant professionals do their work and acknowledges outstanding contributions to the field of grantsmanship. The awards process includes a review of nominations, scoring of nominations, and interviews with finalists. RDDCF was a recipient due to our impactful work in the community, specifically in regards to our inclusive grantmaking practices.

"Receiving this award is an outstanding acknowledgment of the work that we have done to connect with our community in a way that ensures that everyone belongs and feels heard, and that the greatest impact is being made," said Krista Nymark VandenBrink, RDDCF Board Chair.

Nominator Tammy Tilzey of Foundant Technologies stated RDDCF deeply impacts both community and the profession with innovative ideas, relationship-building, and funding decisions.

By focusing on the principle of "nothing for us without us," RDDCF is consistently seeking innovative approaches to both granting and reporting practices. This includes re-evaluating funding processes, piloting participatory grantmaking initiatives and working with local Indigenous communities to re-imagine grant measurement tools.

"What makes this award so special is that it recognizes the value of our unique participatory grantmaking process which allows agencies to come together and promotes collaboration and inclusion," Nymark VandenBrink continues. "The Board of Directors acknowledges the hard and sometimes uncomfortable work that goes into innovative granting. But it is this innovation that can ignite the most change."

This innovation could be seen in action with our participatory grantmaking process, implemented during the adjudication for the Fund for Gender Equality Grant, when applicants were included in the decision-making process, enabling grantees to come together to share insights, collaborate, and build relationships that would not have existed without RDDCF proactively playing the role of community convener.

RDDCF is also working to ensure long-term sustainability through our Youth in Philanthropy program, introducing youth to the concept of philanthropy through hands-on experiences to explore charities, social needs, and financial responsibility.

The Grantmaker of the Year award was presented to Executive Director Erin Peden during the GPA Annual Conference on November 3, 2022 in Louisville, Kentucky.

Community Minded



BANNOCK BAGS

In December 2022, the Red Deer & District Community Foundation was approached by several local Indigenous agencies who shared a collective concern about imminent issues of food insecurity for the community members they serve. The RDDCF Board of Directors was able to respond with \$10,000 in emergency funding to support over 200 households within Red Deer to supplement the distribution of annual Christmas Bannock Bags.



The Christmas Bannock Bags provided dried goods to make bannock, as well as other essentials, to over 200 individuals and families. The funding from RDDCF was used to purchase gift cards to be included in the Christmas Bannock Bags, to be used by recipients to purchase a protein, or any other necessities from Central Alberta Co-op, who also contributed by donating additional gift cards.

"This is such a great demonstration of community effort," said Erin Peden, Executive Director of RDDCF. "Because of our relationship with these agencies, and our previous discussions regarding financial support, we were able to meet this request for emergency funding, knowing the value of the Christmas Bannock Bags."

"We have incredible agencies here in Red Deer, and they are working tirelessly to provide support and programming for Indigenous families and individuals in our community," said Peden. "We applaud their efforts to help the Indigenous community during what is a challenging time for so many. The Christmas Bannock Bags are such an important community initiative, and one that our Board of Directors immediately understood as vital."

RURAL COMMUNITIES RECEIVE LOCAL SUPPORT

For over 20 years, the Sylvan Lake Endowment Fund and the Olds Community Legacy Fund have been distributing grants to local agencies to strengthen the quality of life of residents of Sylvan Lake and Olds.

This year, the Sylvan Lake Endowment Fund granted over \$7,000 to local agencies supporting programs in the arts, mental health, and health care areas, while the Olds Community Legacy Fund granted \$3,000. Grantees are chosen by adjudication committees made up of residents who deeply understand and care for their communities.

"These endowment funds are such a wonderful demonstration of communities caring for the long term needs of their citizens," said Erin Peden, Executive Director of RDDCF. "Because of investments made decades ago, these funds will continue to support these vibrant communities for years to come."

"Recipients of 2022 grants from these funds include Mountain View Emergency Shelter Society, the Mountain View Museum, the Olds & District Hospice Society, Red Deer Royals, and Shalom Counselling Centre of Alberta.

These community grants are open to charities and qualified donees based in Sylvan Lake, Olds, or surrounding areas.

ASPIRE SPECIAL NEEDS RESOURCE CENTRE

The Community Foundation has been focused on innovative and community-minded initiatives to help agencies secure sustainable funding solutions for the future. As part of these efforts, the Community Foundation contributed \$30,000 to Aspire Special Needs Resource Centre in the form of an endowment. Aspire also contributed \$30,000, giving Aspire an initial \$60,000 endowment that will generate yearly disbursements, providing consistency and sustainability.

Aspire's Fee Assistance Endowment was created to support Aspire's desire to have a long-term solution to meet the ongoing needs of the children and families they serve. Aspire's Fee Assistance Program ensures that Aspire can provide barrier-free access to their programs and services for all children and families, regardless of their financial situation. "We have been seeing grant applications from Aspire since 2014," said Erin Peden, RDDCF Executive Director. "And each and every time, the adjudication committee was left feeling like this is an absolutely essential program for central Alberta. So with an eye towards sustainability, we arranged a conversation with Aspire to see if we could work collaboratively to build an endowment fund."

"We jumped on board right away with the Community Foundation," said Aspire's Executive Director, JoAnne Hayden. "This endowment will help us to develop consistency, allowing us to fulfill our goal of supporting families that need our services today, as well as the families who will need our services in the future."

The Aspire Fee Assistance Endowment will use the annual investment income for families needing financial support. Aspire hopes to grow this fund through donations, with the ultimate goal of having the disbursement cover the full needs of families seeking access.With the creation of this endowment, Aspire and the Community Foundation are collaborating on a forward-thinking, sustainable funding solution.

"It was about knowing that we have a sense of security, not only for us but for our families," said Hayden.

EVA SCHMIDT MEMORIAL ENDOWMENT FUND

2022 saw the Grand Opening of "Eva's Children's Reading Corner" at the Ponoka Jubilee Library. This warm and welcoming space was created through the Eva Schmidt Endowment Fund, established by Eva Schmidt's family to memorialize "Miss Eva," who was a dedicated advocate of children, with a gift for using music, art, and literature to engage young people. She had a unique understanding of children, and a passion for ensuring that the children she cared for were loved and nurtured.

Thanks to this fund, each year the Ponoka Jubilee Library will receive disbursement funds to support the development of the children's collection. A cozy corner has been created featuring colourful artwork by renowned Vancouver artist Zbigniew Kupczynski, and space for children to curl up with a book as they explore, learn, and imagine.

"This fund will ensure that generations of children in Ponoka will have access to not only a wonderful space within the library, but to the magic that can be found in the pages of a book," said Erin Peden, RDDCF Executive Director. "What a beautiful legacy to live on in Eva's name."


